New restoration leads Main Street revival

The restoration of one of Washington's historic buildings provides a centerpiece as Main Street businesses from bayou to bayou are putting on a fresh look.

Architect Steven Ortego has purchased the building at the corner of Main and Carriere, which most recently housed Plantation Antiques. He plans to turn it into the Klaus House Boutique Hotel, with nine bedrooms on the second floor and



commercial space on the first. The building was built as a general merchandise store about 1870 by Jacob Plonsky and was later operated by Max Klaus.

Also on Main Street,

- Brent and Marcy Leger are remodeling the former Doucet Motors at the corner of Main and Dejean for use as a specialty meat market.
- ◆ Renovations have been ongoing to the 1830s building at Main and Moundville used recently as the Old Courtableau Café. It is now available for lease. Owner David Allemond received the St. Landry preservationist of the year award for the initial reconstruction.
- ◆ Ben and Pat Fontenot are cleaning up and rebuilding Olde Wood Accents after a major fire last December.
- Negotiations are underway to clean up the Mobil station near Bayou Courtableau that has been in significant decline.
- ◆ Norma and Andy Mahmaud are planning to enlarge the Main Street Grocery.
- ◆ Nanny Belle's Antiques and Washington Thrift-T-Way sport fresh paint jobs.
- ♦ Washington Fast Food has rebranded from Citgo to Phillips 66 gasoline. The adjacent carwash has been repainted by its new owner, Wes Walker, who with his wife Ashley are also the new owners of Ardoin's Grocery.
 - ◆ Attractive seating and planters brighten the fronts of Lou's Bakery and Shear Perfection.
 - ♦ New flags to line the street have been donated by the Steamboat City Association, and the

Washington Community Festival has funded several new benches, including one at the Washington Museum, which is open again from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. on Friday, Saturday, and Sunday,

Thursday will be trash day beginning October 1

Garbage collection here will go to once a week on October 1, when Bayou State Waste becomes the new provider for St. Landry Parish. Residential waste will be picked up each Thursday in Washington, Kyle Lavergne of Bayou State said.

A new 96-gallon bin will be provided to each household. The old bins will also be allowed, if they are not picked up by Waste Management, Lavergne said.

Bins must be in place by 4 a.m. on the pickup day. They must be at least 3 feet away from vehicles or other obstructions, with the wheels and handle toward your house. You are also allowed up to two bags of garbage to be placed outside the cart on pickup day.

Bulky waste too large to fit in the garbage bin will be picked up separately by Morgan and Morgan Land Prep. Lavergne said Bayou State will alert them when items are seen at the curb during the regular collection, and they should be picked up within several days.

Routine yard waste will be picked up on the same day as bulk pickup. It must be bundled or bagged. Bundles should be less than six feet in

length and two feet in diameter and weigh less than 75 pounds. Construction material, remodeling debris, remnants of land clearing or demolitions, hazardous waste (including paint and motor oil), tires, propane tanks, concrete, batteries, and car parts, will not be picked up.

St. Landry residents can bring waste to the landfill at Beggs. You must provide proof that you live in St. Landry Parish with either a driver's license or utility bill.

The landfill cannot accept hazardous waste or industrial by-products. All other general household, construction, or business waste is accepted. You must unload the waste yourself.

The town will continue to pick up debris as a service when workers and equipment are available.

Council OKs \$145,000 in grants

The Town Council approved agreements allowing Mayor Dwight Landreneau to accept \$145,000 in grants to be used mainly for utilities improvements. They include, the following:

- ♦ \$50,000 for public works projects and vehicles;
- ♦ \$50,000 for drainage improvements;
- ♦ \$40,000 for sewer, water, gas, and drainage improvements; and general economic development.
 - ♦ \$45,000 to buy and maintain utilities equipment.
