## CITY OF PORTAGEVILLE – DRAFT STAY AT HOME ORDER

## Distributed April 5, 2020

In response to the Governor's Stay Home Missouri order, the City of Portageville has developed the following plan to promote social distancing during the COVID-19 pandemic. This order will take effect at 12:01 a.m. on Tuesday, April 7, 2020 and remain in effect until 12:01 p.m. on April 19, 2020, unless extended, repealed or otherwise modified by the Portageville Board of Aldermen.

- Non-Essential Businesses: All non-essential businesses will cease operations. This includes "curb-side pickup." Non-essential businesses include but are not limited to hair salons/ barber shops, gyms, clothing stores, boutiques, flower shops, etc. This does not prohibit non-essential business owners from conducting inventory or maintenance within their place of business. In addition, non-essential business will still be allowed to conduct delivery services between the hours of 10:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m., Monday through Friday, provided that their delivery does not have contact with customers.
- Essential Businesses Currently Operating with Curb Side or Delivery Services Only: These essential businesses can continue operations as they are currently; however, any essential business that opens its doors to the public before the end of this order must first contact City Hall to obtain a maximum occupancy customer number BEFORE opening its doors.
- Essential Businesses Currently Open to the Public: The following is a list of Portageville businesses who are currently open to public traffic and the number of customers allowed inside the business. This number does not include employees of the businesses.

For ease in determining the number of occupants in both Food Rite and Dollar General, shopping carts will be provided for all customers. The number of shopping carts available is equal to the total allowed occupancy of that business. Each customer must have their own shopping cart. In the case of minor children under the age of 10, they may accompany their parent/guardian in one cart. Every customer over the age of 10 must have their own individual cart. No minor child under the age of 16 can shop unless accompanied by an adult. In the case of

Portageville Truck Stop, the area with video gaming is closed to all customers for the duration of this order.

- Public Activities: All public activities such as walking, bicycling, jogging, etc. on public areas is allowed. City parks will remain open, with the exception of the basketball courts at Katie Williamson Park on Foster Ave. Park citizens are encouraged to practice proper social distancing and hygiene at all times while conducting public activities.
- Churches/Religious Gatherings: Religious gatherings may be held inside churches provided there are no more than 10 individuals inside the church at one time and all social distancing precautions are followed. Outside Religious activities may be held without limit to participants, if proper social distancing precautions are followed.
- Curfew: At this time, no curfew will be in effect for the City of Portageville. A curfew may be imposed by the Mayor at a later time to insure public health and safety.

If you are unsure of the status of your business, i.e. if it qualifies as an essential business, or if you believe that your business provides an essential service, please contact City Hall for Guidance. Below is a list of Essential and Non-Essential Businesses provided by Governor Parsons.

Essential workers, services and sectors include, but are not limited to:

- Healthcare workers and caregivers
- Law enforcement, fire fighters, and first responders
- Government operations
- Mental health and Social Service workers
- Pharmacy employees
- Workers supporting groceries, pharmacies and other retail sales of food and beverage products
- Restaurant carryout and quick-serve food operations and food delivery employees
- Farmworkers
- Electricity and Utility Industry Employees
- Critical Manufacturing Employees (medical supply chains, energy, transportation, food, chemicals)
- Petroleum, Natural and Propane Gas Workers
- Transportation and Logistics Workers
- Communications and Information Technology Employees
- Banks
- Daycares, child care providers (NOTE: These businesses are allowed to provide care for working families, but are asked CDC guidance targeted for those operations)

Non-essential workers, services and sectors include, but are not limited to:

- Entertainment and hospitality, including but not limited to strip clubs, casinos, concert venues, arenas, auditoriums, stadiums, large conference rooms, meeting halls, and cafeterias
- Recreation and athletic facilities, including but not limited to community and recreation centers, gyms, health clubs, fitness centers, yoga, barre and spin facilities
- Beauty and personal care services and facilities, including but not limited to barber shops, beauty, tanning, waxing hair salons, and nail salons and spas
- Retail facilities, including shopping malls except for pharmacy or other health care facilities within retail operations
