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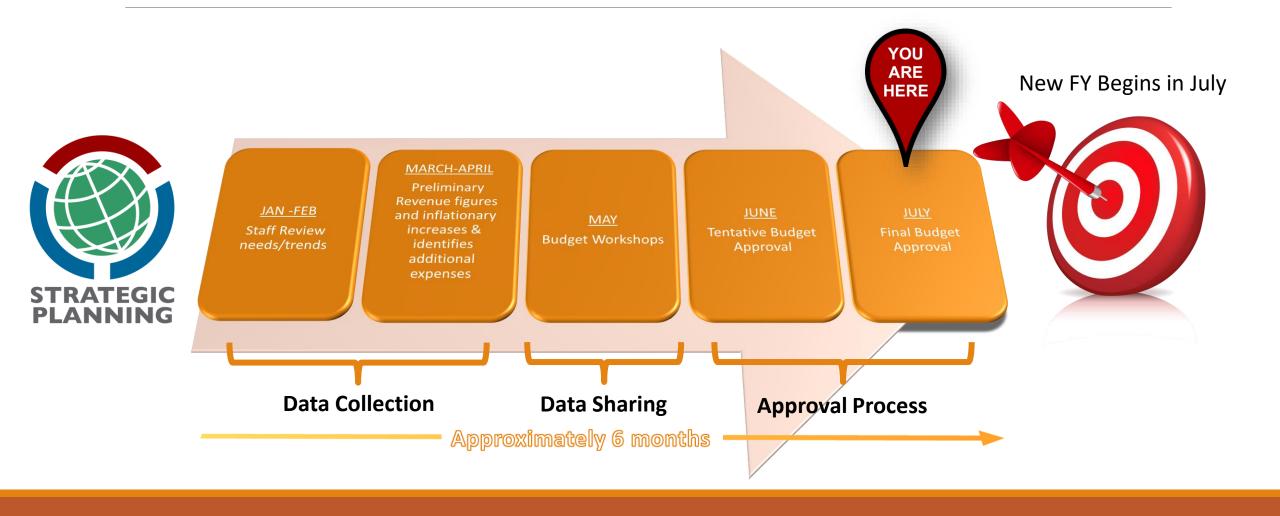

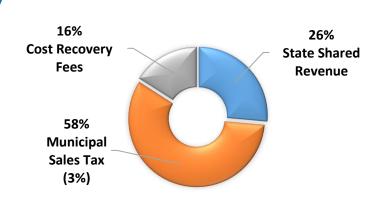

FORECASTED REVENUES

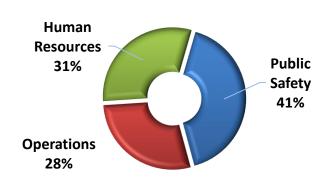

Purchase of Fire Truck

- •In 2005, the Town purchased land and built the Town's firehouse, and began to equip all furnishing and fire and emergency equipment.
- Part of this original investment was a fire truck.
- •The original fire truck was built by American LaFrance.
- Approximately 20 years later, this company is no longer building fire trucks and replacement parts have become difficult to find.

Purchase of Fire Truck

- Chief Russel and his engineers have worked with the Town to identify the most appropriate apparatus.
- A truck built by Pierce, a nationally renown manufacturer of fire apparatus has been identified.
- This pumper trucker will have foam capabilities, contain a robust enforcer chassis, interior cab storage for emergency medical equipment, and significant exterior storage space for all other rescue equipment.



Purchase of Fire Truck

- •The Truck is being purchased through the Sourcewell cooperative, of which the Town is a member.
- Purchase cooperatives like the Sourcewell Cooperative provide purchase procurement services which are conducted on behalf of public entities.
- •The specific apparatus under this cooperative pricing will be \$863,443.00 with applicable taxes total price will be \$935,143.66 with an anticipated delivery date of October 2023.
- •From a comparative perspective, if procurement is done independently such pricing could be 15-20% more and the total process could take 2-3 years to receive a vehicle.
- •In essence, using a purchase cooperative saves time and money which is why most fire departments are using cooperatives today to purchase their vehicles.

• COUNCIL ACTION:

• Authorization of approximately \$935,000 of Capital Funds to purchase a new Pierce-manufactured pumper truck for the fire department.



Phase 3 of Gardens Stucco Repairs

- 2 summers ago, the Town began a phased approach to address the recurring issue of peeling and bubbling paint on the exterior wall surfaces throughout the Town Gardens.
- These repairs included waterproofing and restuccing of exterior walls and the application of a ceramic paint called Rhino Shield (which contains a 25-year warranty).
- This incremental approach permitted the Town to evaluate the performance of the repairs before making larger investments.
- The 1st phase involved the restroom/visitor center building, and the 2nd phase include walls within the amphitheater and east to the sundial.











Phase 3 of Gardens Stucco Repairs

- 3rd phase, the largest phase to date, will involve addressing all the walls between the amphitheater and the bridge connecting to and from the post office building.
- This phase will include two pedestrian bridges, three ramadas, equipment enclosures, as well as low seat walls.
- •The final phase of the project will tackle the walls including the post office bridge to the traffic circle at Carefree Drive.
- •The Rhino Shield carries a 25-year warranty against cracking, bubbling, and peeling.
- During each subsequent phase the contractor has reviewed the performance of the project and made necessary repairs to previous applications.

Phase 3 of Gardens Stucco Repairs

COUNCIL ACTION:

 Authorization of \$75,000 plus applicable taxes of capital funds (\$37,500 Stucco Repairs + \$37,500 Rhino Shield) to repair stucco and apply ceramic paint to walls located between the amphitheater and the bridge into/from the post office.





Desert Gardens - refresh

- During the summer of 2021, a top coating or refresh of the decomposed granite within the gardens was completed.
- Due to a combination of foot traffic, raking and heavy use by pets, bare spots have gradually emerged again.
- Desert Foothills Landscape has inventoried these areas and proposed over 20 tons of new decomposed granite to refresh these areas.
- Furthermore, the planter located on the northwest side of the amphitheater will also undergo a landscape restoration, with the introduction of complementing plants that can be found in nearby planters.
- All of this work will be performed upon the completion of the stucco repair and repainting.

COUNCIL ACTION:

 Authorization of approximately \$7,300 of Capital Funds for garden refresh.
