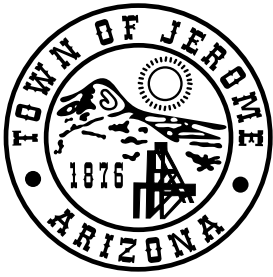

STAFF SUMMARY REPORT

ITEM: **ITEM #2: ALTERNATIVE EXPENDITURE LIMITATION (HOME RULE)**

Background/History:

Any city or town may adopt its own "alternative" expenditure limitation (also known as "Home Rule") that is free from any ties to the State imposed limitation if a majority of the qualified electors voting on the issue at the city/town regular election vote in favor of the alternative limitation. An alternative limitation may be referred to the city/town voters by an affirmative vote of two-thirds of the members of the city/town council. If approved, the annual adopted budget becomes the alternative expenditure limitation for the city or town and remains in effect for four consecutive years. If the alternative limitation is defeated by the voters, no new alternative expenditure limitation may be submitted to the voters for at least two years, and the city or town will be subject to the State limitation.

The voters of the Town of Jerome in 1982, 1986, 1990, 1994, 1998, 2002 and 2006 adopted an alternative expenditure limitation - home rule option. Voters in 2010 and 2011 adopted a one-time override, accomplishing the same purpose. In 2012 and 2016, an alternative expenditure limitation was once again approved by Jerome voters by a wide margin. It is now time to reaffirm the alternative expenditure limitation in 2020.

A city/town council contemplating an alternative expenditure limitation must hold two public hearings on the proposed action. Notice of these hearings must be published twice, and following the second hearing, the council must vote on the proposed alternative expenditure limitation. A record of the vote and, if approved, the amount of expenditure in excess of the State limitation and purposes for the excess expenditure must be published.

Public hearings have been scheduled for March 17 and March 24, 2020 and notice was published in the Verde Independent on March 4 and March 11. Following the March 24 hearing, Council will be asked to vote on the proposed alternative expenditure limitation, and a record of the vote will be published.

At least 60 days prior to the election, we must submit a detailed analysis, summary analysis and summary analysis worksheet to the Auditor General for review. The detailed analysis of the alternative expenditure limitation must contain specific amounts estimated to be expended in specific areas for a period of four consecutive years, and specific amounts of estimated revenue from each and any source, and any assumptions used in estimating such revenue, for a period of four consecutive years. I will be preparing and submitting these analyses to the Auditor General.

We must also prepare a publicity pamphlet for this election, containing information required by

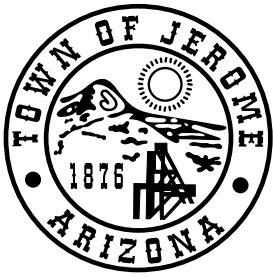
statute, including any arguments for or against the proposal. It must be provided to each household within the town containing a registered voter at least 10 days before the election. Any arguments for or against the alternative expenditure limitation must be filed with my office no later than May 6, 2020. I will be working with Runbeck Election Services to prepare and mail the required publicity pamphlet.

A full timeline is attached for your reference.

Key Considerations:

- If approved, the expenditure authority will be used only for local purposes including police, fire, courts, library and youth programs, economic and community development, parks and recreation, street maintenance and improvements, water and wastewater systems operations and maintenance, refuse and recycling services, and other important public services.
- Without approval of the alternative expenditure limitation, the Town will be limited to spending only \$474,617 in 2020-21, and similar amounts in succeeding years, resulting in drastic reductions in these same services.
- Home Rule allows the Town to decide for itself what services it will provide to its residents through the annual public budget process, rather than be subjected to formulaic restrictions imposed by the State.
- The proposal does not permit the Town to spend more than it receives, and it is not a tax increase. Actual expenditures will continue to be subject to the public budgeting process and the Town's fiscal policies.
- Jerome voters have consistently approved a local alternative to the State-imposed expenditure limit every four years since 1982.

RESOLUTION NO. 595

A RESOLUTION OF THE TOWN COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF JEROME PROPOSING AN ALTERNATIVE EXPENDITURE LIMITATION

WHEREAS, the Arizona State Constitution permits the submission to the voters of a city or town of an alternative expenditure limitation; and

WHEREAS, the Jerome voters in 1986, 1990, 1994, 1998, 2002, 2006, 2012 and 2016 authorized the local alternative expenditure limitation (Home Rule Option); and

WHEREAS, the Town Council of Jerome after two public hearings has determined that an extension of the alternative expenditure limitation is necessary for the Town of Jerome;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Town Council of Jerome, Arizona that the following alternative expenditure limitation be submitted to the voters of the Town of Jerome:

Shall the following be adopted by the Town of Jerome as an alternative expenditure limitation:

"The Mayor and Common Council of the Town of Jerome shall annually, as part of the annual budget adoption process, adopt an alternative expenditure limitation equal to the total amount of budgeted expenditures/expenses as it appears on the annual budget as adopted by the Council, to apply to the Town of Jerome for each of the four fiscal years immediately following adoption of the alternative expenditure limitation. The alternative expenditure limitation shall be adopted each year after a public hearing at which the citizens of the Town of Jerome may comment on the proposed alternative expenditure limitation. No expenditures may be made in violation of such alternative expenditure limitation, nor may any proposed expenditures be in excess of estimated available revenues, except that the Mayor and the Common Council may, by three-fourths vote, declare an emergency and suspend the alternative expenditure limitation. The suspension of the alternative expenditure limitation shall be in effect for only one fiscal year at a time."

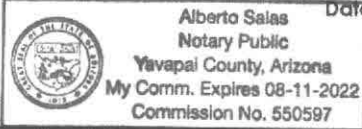

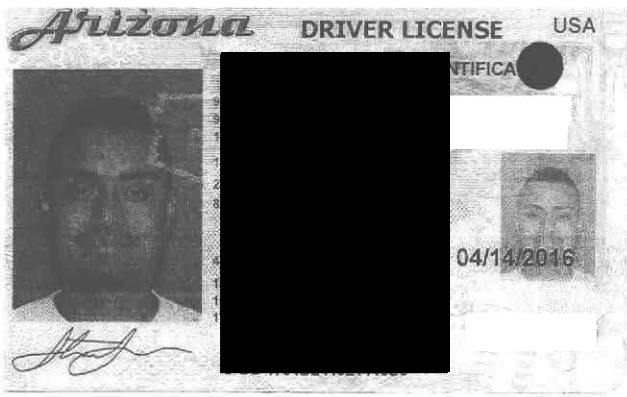

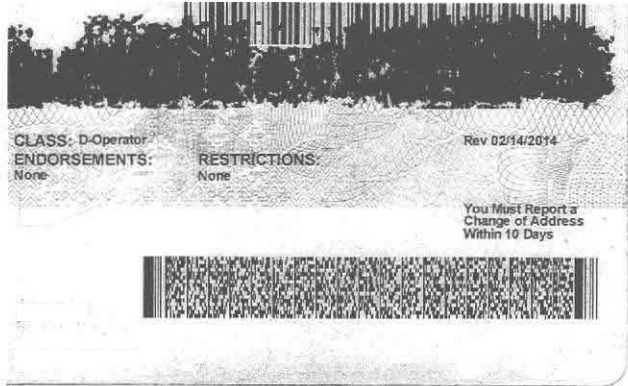

As I have done each morning since the start of this situation, I have reviewed all of the current information from the sources that have the most current and relevant information on the current state of affairs concerning the COVID – 19 situation.

Federal Level

The White House Coronavirus Task Force issued a new initiative called “15 Days to Slow the Spread.” This initiative lays out guidelines in an effort to blunt the impact of COVID-19. This includes canceling or postponing gatherings of more than 10 people. While the new guidelines are recommended for the next 15 days, government leaders will continually reassess the status of the outbreak in the United States. It may be that these measures will need to be modified or extended for additional periods of time.

State of Arizona

- On March 20, 2020, President Trump announced restrictions to cross-border travel to Mexico. Similar to the parameters set with Canada, limits only apply to recreational and tourist travel. The President also announced waiving student loan payments for 60 days and extending the tax filing deadline to July 15, 2020.^[15]

- On March 19, 2020, all events at the Phoenix Convention Center, Orpheum Theatre and Symphony Hall have been postponed or rescheduled through May 10, 2020.^[16]

Yavapai County Emergency Management

They have moved from Level II EOC to a Level I EOC. They may request assistance from communities to staff the EOC (Emergency Operations Center)

Town of Jerome

We have a state of emergency declaration in place that is equal to all current Federal, State and County guidelines as they pertain to COVID – 19. This also opens the door to emergency aid and assistance if needed. That is the primary reason for the declaration.

Police and Fire departments have proper equipment for response to suspected COVID – 19 emergencies, with special policies put in place for personnel. No immediate concerns at this time. I have requested additional PPE supplies from county emergency services for first responders in case this is drawn out over multiple weeks and or months. Volunteers have secured more gloves. We are actually in a better state than most fire and police agencies in the state, as we are geographically isolated and currently well equipped.

The police department has suspended the parking enforcement officer as well as the administrative assistant until further notice. I am basically working with myself and two other police officers. Clarkdale PD is expanding to 24 hr patrol and will patrol our streets during the time we don't have an active patrol going. So, there will be a marked police car visible at all hours of the day and night. I have issued restrictions to our officers on public contacts and updated PPE procedures.

I visited all restaurants and bars and reviewed the governor's order with them. All bars have been closed and all restaurants have ceased dine in services.

Only about a quarter of retail businesses are open, they continue to restrict visitors to the under 10 as recommended.

Candace, Marty (PW), Rusty (Fire) and I are meeting or communicating regularly to insure we address those things that might surface.

I am working with Marty and instituting a security patrol for our water system. We will be checking the system with eye on all critical components. I am also putting a wireless video camera at the public works building with eyes on our water tanks and supplies, as well as one at the PD to keep an eye on Main Street the station.

The Clarkdale / Jerome Schools have a meal plan for those students who live in Jerome. Info is on police and fire facebook pages. They have been coming up each morning.

We have been in contact with our elderly and at-risk citizens and are providing food delivery so they can maintain isolation.

At this point I believe our response is appropriate, and we are able to handle the current situation with the resources we have. Remember, that could change.

Additionally, I do not see a need for heightened restrictions at this point (from Jerome position).

People everywhere want to know if they are infected with the coronavirus. Testing in the United States isn't able to keep up with the demand, and that goes for Arizona as well.

As manufacturing of test collection kits increases over the next several weeks testing will become more readily available to those at highest risk.

Older adults and people of any age who have serious underlying medical conditions may be at higher risk for more serious complications from COVID-19. These people who may be at higher risk of getting very sick from this illness, includes:

- **Older adults**
- **People who have serious underlying medical conditions** like:
 - Heart disease
 - Diabetes
 - Lung disease
- **Symptoms – Cough, fever, tiredness, difficulty breathing (sever cases)**
People may be sick with the virus for 1-14 days before developing symptoms. If you start developing symptoms, **please stay home and call your healthcare provider** for screening and possible testing.

Executive Order 2020-14

Postponement of Eviction Actions

WHEREAS, a Public Health State of Emergency was declared in Arizona on March 11, 2020 to prepare for and respond to the outbreak of the 2019 novel coronavirus (COVID-19); and

WHEREAS, the President of the United States declared a national emergency on March 13, 2020 due to both the health and economic implications of the COVID-19 virus; and

WHEREAS, the President of the United States announced on March 18, 2020, that the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), in an effort to provide immediate relief to renters, will temporarily suspend all evictions for HUD-financed properties; and

WHEREAS, the State of Arizona has experienced community spread of COVID-19 in multiple counties as it continues to spread across the country and the state, posing an increasing threat to public health and having a devastating impact on the economy; and

WHEREAS, the state has taken critical measures to protect public health and safety, which will result in direct economic consequences for businesses across the State of Arizona that provide employment for many Arizonans; and

WHEREAS, in order to prevent the spread of COVID-19 and protect citizens from individuals who may become infected, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention have recommended that people self-isolate if they have been exposed to COVID-19 or if they have a condition that puts them at risk for serious harm by the disease; and

WHEREAS, it may become medically necessary for Arizonans to remain in their rental properties to stay isolated and separated from the general public; and

WHEREAS, those who must self-isolate or who are unable to work, may experience a decrease in income and thus their ability to pay for regular living expenses; and

WHEREAS, the anticipated loss of work and income for Arizonans and their families may impact their ability to pay for their rental housing, resulting in landlords initiating eviction proceedings to remove them from their residences; and

WHEREAS, to further protect public health, it is necessary to to avoid the serious consequence of Arizonans losing their rental housing.

NOW, THEREFORE I, Douglas A. Ducey, Governor of the State of Arizona, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution and laws of this state, hereby order as follows:

1. Unless a court determines on motion of the parties that enforcement is necessary in the interest of justice or is in accordance with A.R.S. § 33-1368(A), pursuant to A.R.S. §§ 26-303 et al, 36-787, all Arizona Peace Officer Standards and Training Board certified law enforcement officers and any person subject to the jurisdiction of the Constable Ethics Standards and Training Board, shall temporarily delay enforcement of eviction action orders for residential premises when one of the following circumstances exist and are documented to the landlord or property owner:
 - a. The individual is required to be quarantined based on their diagnosis of COVID-19.
 - b. The individual is ordered by a licensed medical professional to self-quarantine based on their demonstration of symptoms as defined by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.
 - c. The individual is required to be quarantined based on someone in the home being diagnosed with COVID-19.
 - d. The individual demonstrates that they have a health condition, as defined by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, that makes them more at risk for COVID-19 than the average person.
 - e. The individual suffered a substantial loss of income resulting from COVID-19, including:
 - i. Job loss;
 - ii. Reduction in compensation;
 - iii. Closure of place of employment;
 - iv. Obligation to be absent from work to care for a home-bound school-age child; or
 - v. Other pertinent circumstances.
2. If a tenant, lessee or resident is suffering any of the above circumstances and seeks relief from or delay in eviction, they shall notify the landlord or property owner in writing with any available supporting documentation of their temporary financial hardship or state of quarantine as a result of COVID-19 and acknowledge that contractual terms of the lease remain in effect.
3. A landlord shall not interpret a health and safety provision of a contract to include COVID-19 as a reason for termination of a lease or rental agreement; nor shall a landlord terminate a lease or rental agreement solely based on information provided by the tenant to satisfy a notice requirement under paragraph 2.

4. No provision contained in this Executive Order shall be construed as relieving any individual of the obligation to pay rent or comply with any other obligation that an individual may have under a tenancy.
5. This Executive Order shall remain in effect for 120 days.
